To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas John Brown, of La Porte County, Indiana, has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at La Porte whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said John Brown according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of the 25th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for the lot or fraction of the North West quarter North of the Indian boundary line of Section thirty two, in Township thirty seven North, of Range six West, in the District of Lands subject to sale at La Porte, Indiana, containing one hundred and twenty five acres, according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been purchased by the said John Brown

NOW KNOW YE, That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,** in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have given and granted, and by these presents do give and grant, unto the said John Brown and to his heirs, the said tract above described:

To have and to hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances of whatsoever nature, thereunto belonging, unto the said John Brown and to his heirs and assigns forever.
