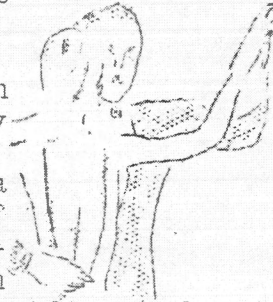
COMPANY DANCE

BEWARE OF EPIDERMOPHY-

SAYS: Dr. TONI! AVOID ATH-
LETE'S FOOT.

ATHLETE'S FOOT is an infectious disease, highly communicable, capable of infecting the skin in various regions of the body so as to cause great discomfort and even total disability. The disease is one closely related to the more common forms of ring worm.

The causative agent is epidermophyton—a form of fungus growth similar to that type of parasitic appendage seen on plants.

A true parasite in every sense of the word, it exists, grows, and multiplies at the expense of the body tissues, namely the skin.

I wonder whether you are aware of the purposes of the skin?

First of all, it serves as a protective covering for all the underling muscles, tendons, nerves and blood vessels; secondly, it serves as a temperature regulator for the body—a thermostat, so to speak; third, it serves as a receptive center for heat, cold, or pain; fourth, it aids in respiration and in elimination of poisonous wastes. It has other uses but the point is, "IT IS IM*PORTANT to YOU!"

Athlete's Foot is actually, the intertrigenous form of epidermophytosis, or in non-technical language, an infection of the toes by this fungus growth.

It is frequently very painful, causing considerable inconvenience as well as economic loss.

The prevalence of the condition, is easily understood, when you take into consideration the parasite and the host. The fungi is fond of moist living conditions; the feet are supplied with numerous sweat glands, thus producing an ideal home for the fungus (fungi). There is also a deficiency of air about the toes due to the conventional practice of wearing shoes and socks. Perhaps if we were able to do without these articles of clothing, the skin of the feet would be much more healthy and less subject to infection.

Yes, there is a purpose in the puddle you walk through in order to reach the showers. There is likewise a purpose for the foot

powder, the ointments and solutions kept handy for you in the infirmary. It all amounts to a prophylaxis against this fungus infection that is so easily ac-

quired and that carries such a high rate of morbidity.

It is important to you as well that the skin of the feet be as clean as the skin of the face. After all, your job and your own living depends on your feet and their ability to carry you around.

Use all the knowledge and facilities available to prevent it.

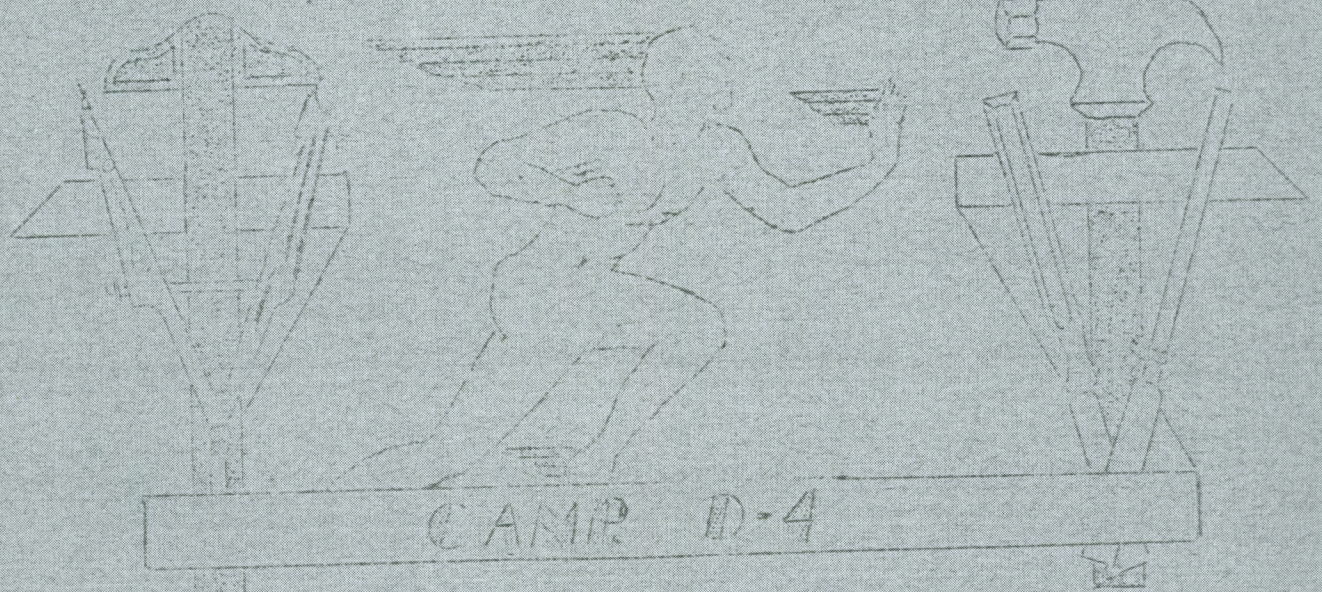
Life is like that!
