

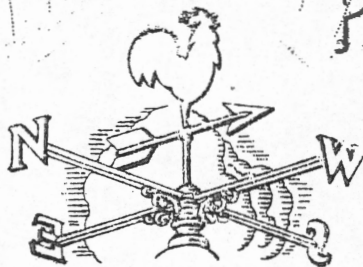

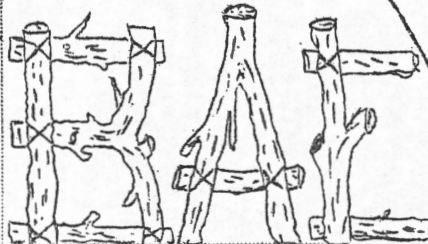
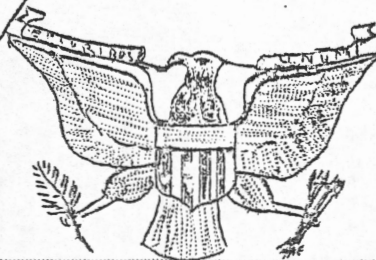

Excavation: 1,087,300 cubic yards

A total of 98,304 man days were expended to complete the above listed work. And, in addition to that, 9,850 man days were used for other types of work done on authorized drainage enterprises located in the work area.

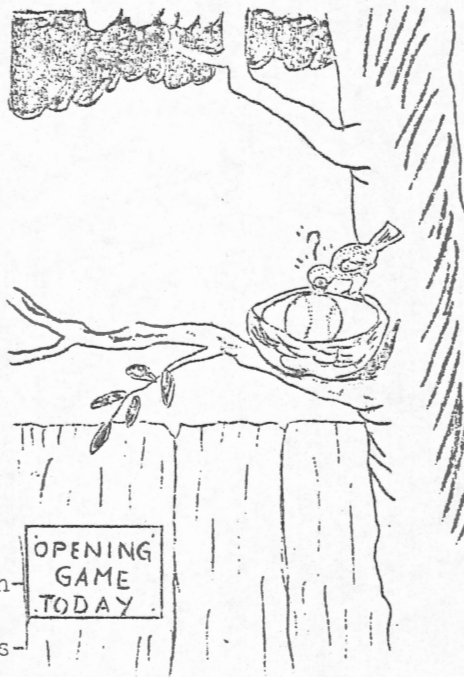

Tsk..Tsk..

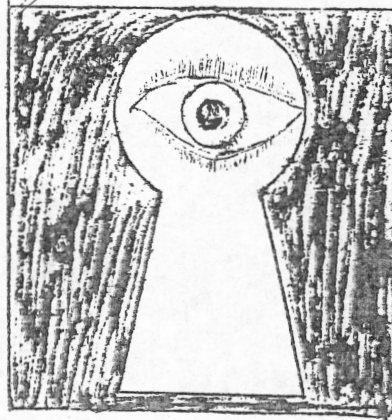
It looks pretty bad for "Judge"..... After an escapade to town he receives a very mysterious phone call on the next morning.....and was he in a daze....

of one fair woman's smile.

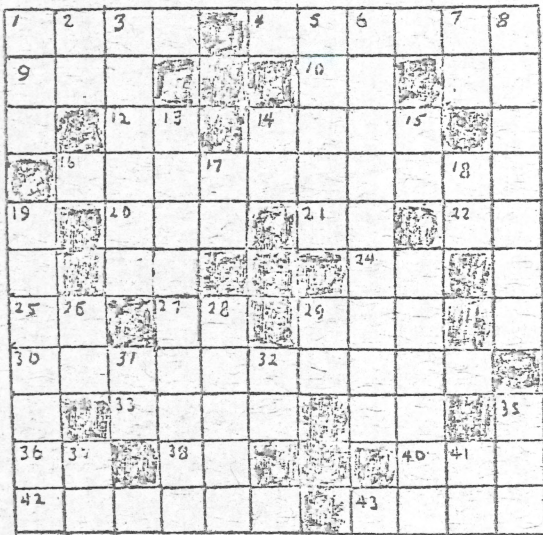
