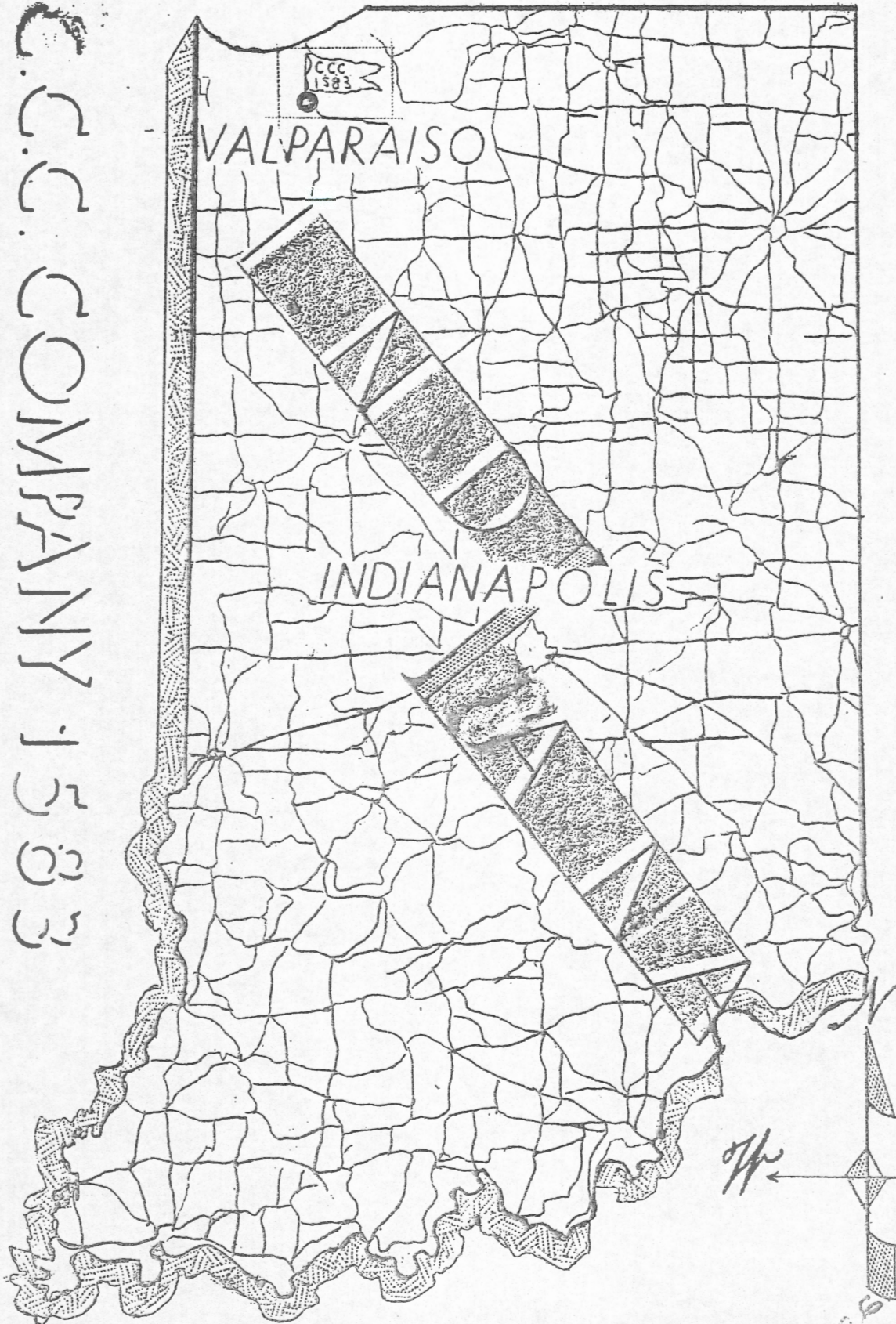
## EDITORIAL NOTE

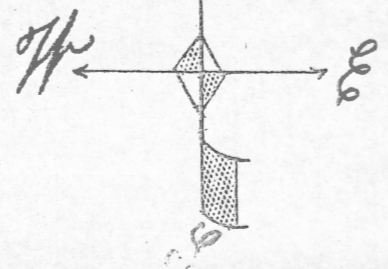
# OUR PLACE ON THE MAP

## EDUCATIONAL ACHIEVEMENT OF CAMP CALUMET REPRESENTS MORE THAN NINETEEN CENTURIES OF TRAINING.

The educational level of the members of Camp Calumet is unusually high as represented by a recent survey of the members of this company.

The following data is interesting and gives a ~~rather~~ complete picture of its members' educational background:

42% of its members are on the college level, having completed high school or twelve years of formal education.

52% of its members are on the high school level, that is, they have completed the eighth grade and are eligible for or have completed some high school work.

7% of its members have finished three years of high school and have one year or less to reach the college level.

16% have completed two years of high school work.

14% have completed one year of high school work.

6% have completed less than eight years of formal education.

The total compiled for the total years of formal education is 1,907 years. This represents more than nineteen centuries of education for the group as a whole.

The average number of years of formal education for the group, that is, the Educational level, is 10.3 years.

We believe that this high educational level is reflected in the splendid morale, the excellent record in educational activities, and in the exceptional ratings that this company has received in the past. There should be a direct relation between education and real achievement. We are certain that this is true in this group.

## FORTY-NINE ENROLLEES RECEIVE FIRST AID CERTIFICATES.

No less than forty-nine members of CCC Company 1583 were presented with first aid certificates issued by the Red Cross. The certificates were issued to those who successfully completed the first course in the subject from the April to June quarter.

According to statistics, this boosts the percentage of camp members who have already completed this essential course about 78%. This record is a real tribute to the efficiency of both, the camp educational teaching staff, as well as, to the boys who are enrolled.
