

FIRE DESTROYS STAKE GARAGE

Six Trucks Burn

As the sun stood high on a beautiful autumn day in October, an incident, not so pleasant as the weather, occurred at CCC Camp SCS-20, home of Company 1583, best Junior company in Indiana. At mid-day on Sunday, October 22, a fire, which destroyed the ECW stake garage and six trucks, was discovered by Tom De Lisle, army orderly. Efforts were made to save the six 1935 Chevrolet stake trucks housed in the building, but in vain.

The fire had gained considerable headway before it was discovered and no one was able to enter the building as heavy blankets of smoke rolled out as the doors were opened. The Valparaiso Fire Department responded promptly to a call made to them but all they were able to save was the west side of the building upon which a safety slogan ironically read "The best 'Safety Device' known is a 'Careful Man.'"

INVESTIGATORS ARRIVE

Mr. E. C. Wynn of Fort Wayne Repair Shop No. 1, who is in charge of properties for the Northern Indiana Area, arrived in camp Sunday night to conduct a personal investigation. Mr. A. R. Jonas, Assistant Regional Ad-

ministrator, in charge of the Indiana SCS CCC Camps also arrived Tuesday afternoon, October 24 for further investigation. However the origin of the fire is still uncertain. Several theories have been advanced, among which the most probable is defective wiring of one of the trucks lighting system.

Fire Also Occurs At Technical Service Building

A fire of considerable smaller proportions than the headlined one broke out on Tuesday, October 10, at the south-east corner of the Technical Service Building. Equipped with a formidable push-broom, that mean but not to mighty "Mac" McClannen proceeded to 'poosh' out the fire. "Front Line" McClannen was aided on the firing line by his able assistant Alvin "Pete the Hill-Billy" Gingerich, also armed with a broom, when "Fire Chief" Fabing arrived with his fire 'putter-outer' everything was in order. The cause of the fire is still undetermined, but our private subtle sleuth is still giving his unlimited time and diligent efforts to the case, and the cause should be forth coming soon. The damage was very slight since the only thing which burned was part of an awning. Considerable damage could have resulted had it not been for the valient efforts of the "Chief," "Broom," and "Pete."
