### NEW PATTERNS FOR WORKSHOP

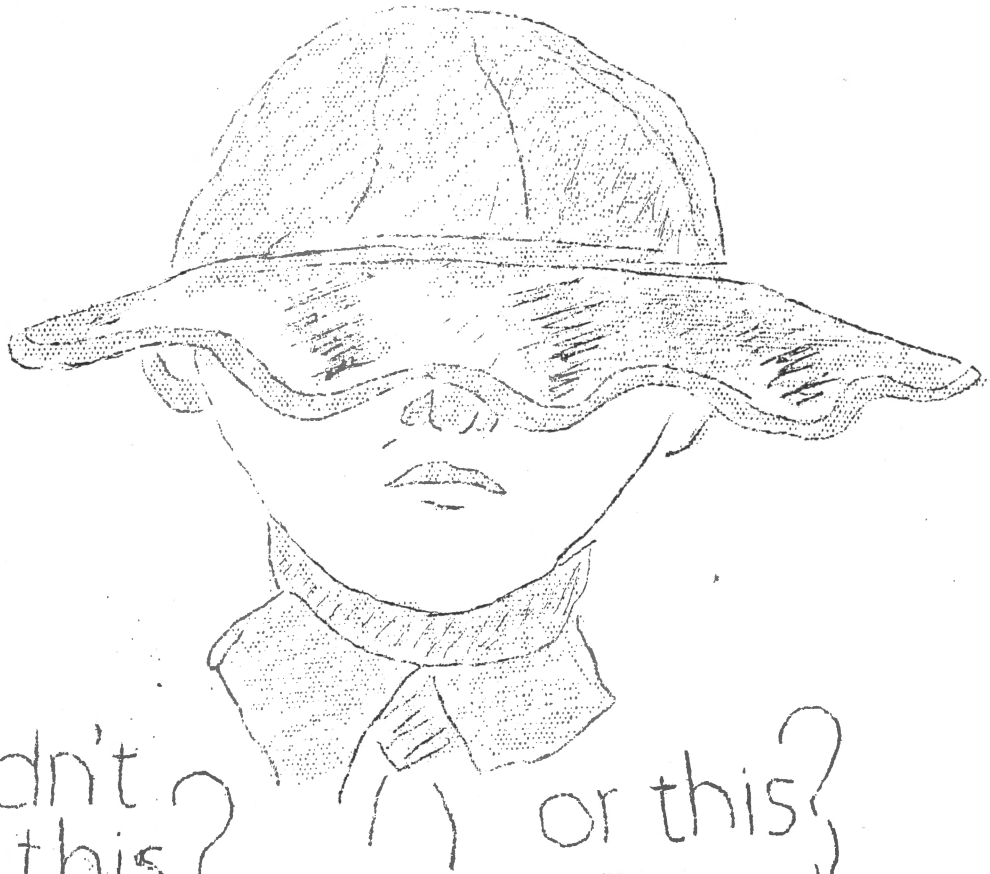
Some new patterns for the handicraft activities have been secured and quite a few new projects have been completed. It has added new interest.

### CORRESPONDENCE COURSES ARE INCREASING IN NUMBER

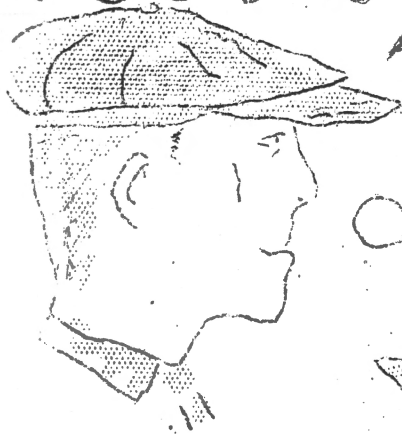
