

New National Defence Training Program Gets Under Way

The new National Defence Training Program in Woodworking for which an application had been made some time ago, was approved by the Director of the CCC and the state Department of Education this week.

Instruction was given to begin the class immediately. The ass in Woodworking was begun March 12th, the class will be charge of Earl J. Williams, a successful carpenter and builder well and favorably known by members of this camp. Considerable enthusiasm has been shown and it is beleived that this activity willprove very valuable to participating members. The group consists of 15 members and will receive 15 hours of instruction per week. The class is set up for 4 hrs.on Monday evening, 3 on Tuesday evening, and 8 hrs on Wednesday.


These new-defence training activities will be initiated as soon as approved. Instructors have been agreed upon for the new courses.




George Tanner one of our new K P.'s. has attended school at Lafayette for first aid training he has got along fine and is teaching first aid here in camp.

A good book to by each member of the companys fireburners in polite society, known as cooks, is "IF SHE COULD ONLY COOK".


