It is hoped that these figures will encourage enrollees to develop themselves physically and mentally both on the job in preparation for their place in business or industry. First National Defense Training Course In Woodworking Will Be Completed May 8

The first National Defense Training course to be initiated by Camp Calumet was Woodworking. It was on March 12th that the first session was held. The last session for the present group will be on May 8th.

This training course has proved very worthwhile and the interest of the members has been excellent. Many of the boys in the group have volunteered additional hours and have made excellent progress. The group, as a whole, is rather young but they have displayed a genuine interest. It is believed that they have benefited greatly from the instruction.

It is planned to continue this course upon completion of the present course on May 8th. By the end of the course, two of its members will have received jobs as apprentice carpenters, one at 75-cts. and one at 50 cts. per hour. This is not strictly a vocational course, but it indicates that some of the ablest members may hope to secure employment in the field where they have this specific training. It is hoped that those who have aptitude in this direction will make application for the next course. Only a limited number can be accommodated, 15 being the maximum.

New National Defense Training -Program In Approved

Approval has been received by the Commanding Officer of Camp Calumet from District Hqrs. for a new National Defense Training course in Elementary Electricity. This approval and instructions for its immediate initiations was received after approval of the Director of the CCC at Washington, D. C. and the State Board for Vocational Education, National Defense Division Indianapolis, Indiana.

The new program will be taught by James R. Walsh, Valparaiso, Ind. who has had considerable successful experience in this field. The course will be practical and all the equipment necessary for its successful operation has been approved for purchase. In addition to this equipment, there will also be an allowance of \$10 per week for supplies and material needed in class work.

The Educational Building will be used for two evenings per week and the shop will be used on another evening. Five hours will be allowed each enrollee from the job in addition to the ten hours that he uses from his own leisure time. The course will be a fifteen hour per week course and will extend over a period of eight weeks.

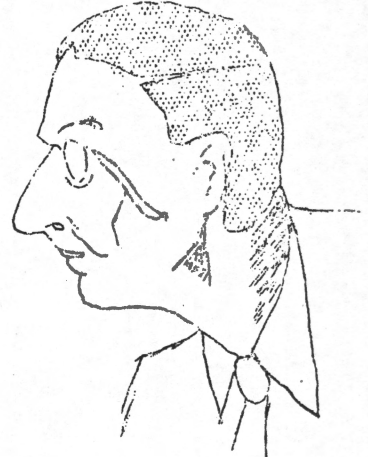
NEW CLERK

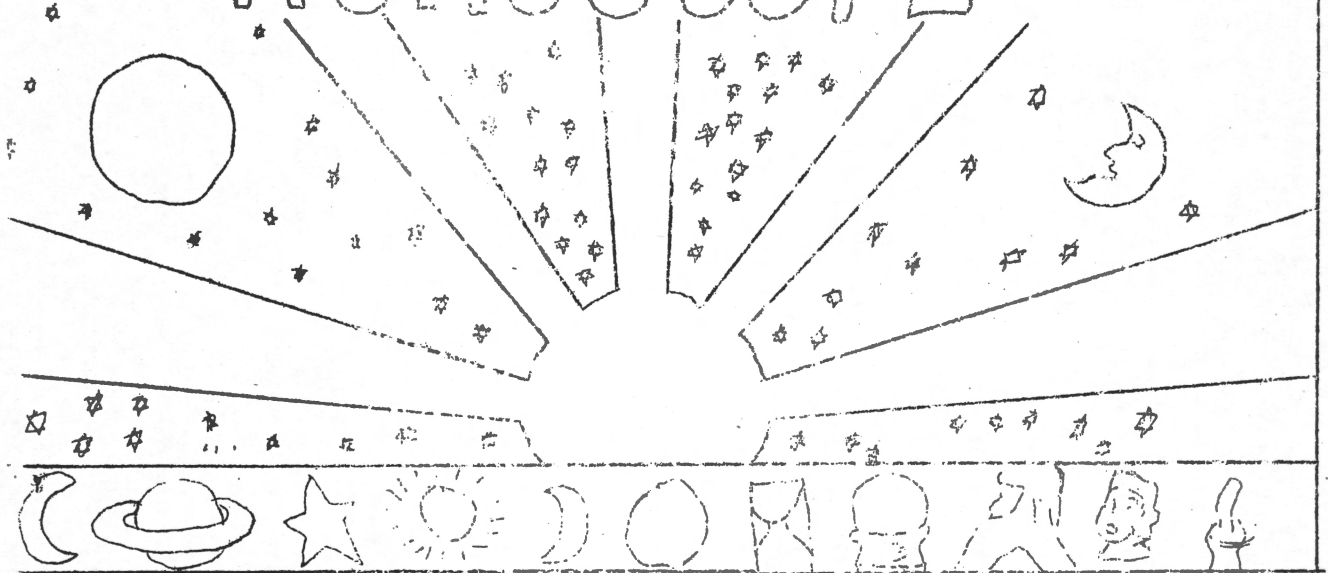
