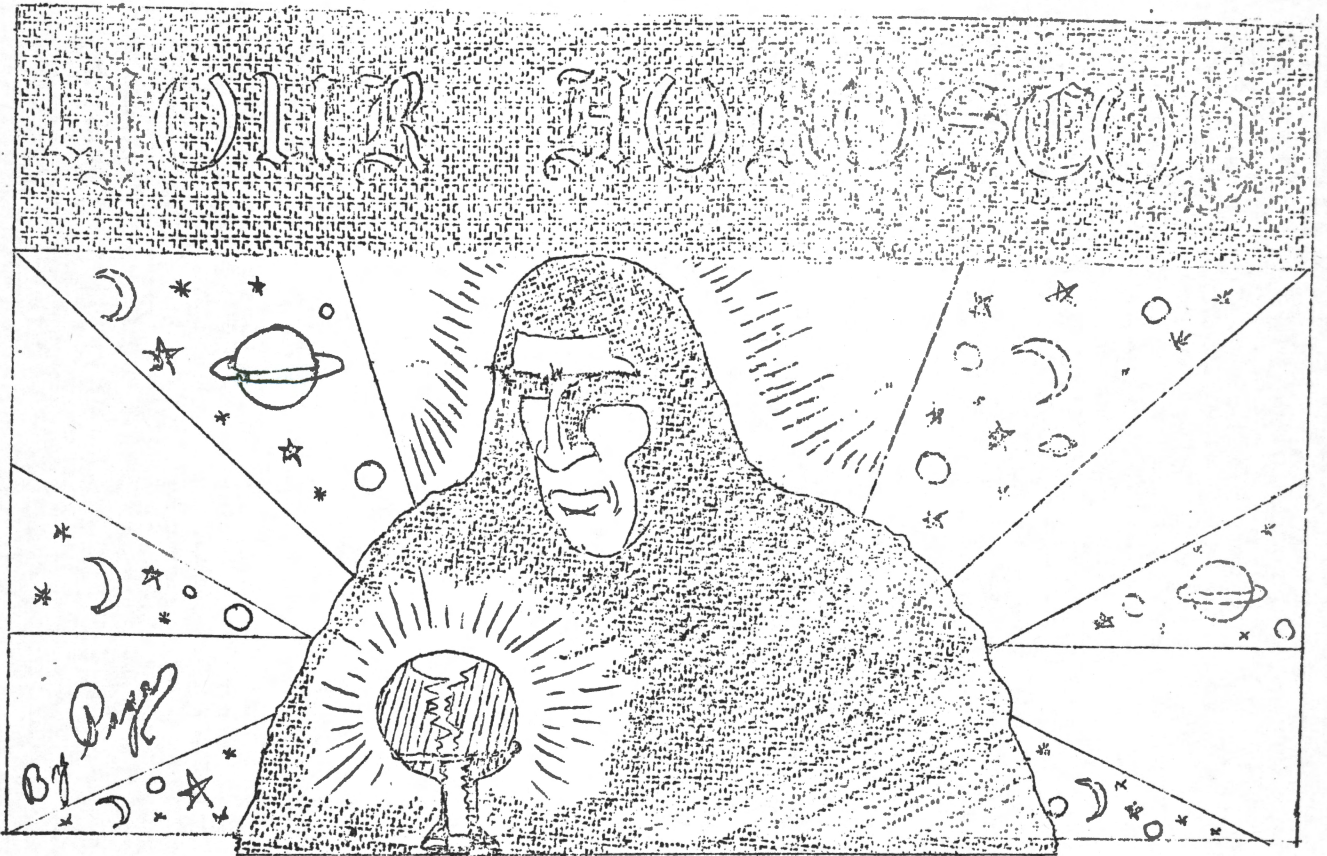
Truck Driving Class
